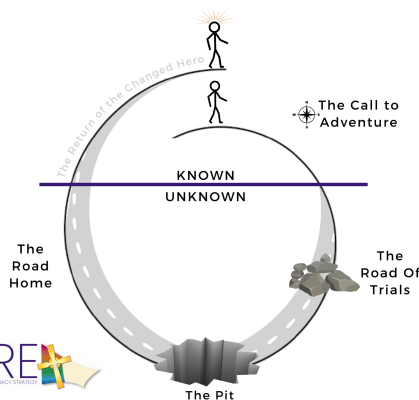
LITERACY

Narrative & Information Report Focus

In the first few weeks of Term 3, we delve into narrative writing.

'Grandpa's Soup' will be the inspiration for the Year 3 narrative pieces, using the Story Spiral as a structure to help students in their writing.

Chemical Science followed by Geography in terms of our knowledge base curriculum in the morning blocks. Classrooms will ensure the complexity of their sentence level writing has increased as they provide more detailed paragraphs. Students will experience the 'Prime Minister's Spelling Bee' which is a free online spelling bee for all Australian students from Year 3 - 6.

MATHS

Time & Angles, Data Representation & the Four Operations ($\times \div + -$)

Analogue clocks are always a large focus in Year 3, recognising and reading the time and making connections to digital clocks.



Students formulate an understanding of time estimation based on events and activities. On the completion of Time, Students move into recognising and measuring angles in their school environment.

In Data Representation, Year 3s interpret and create two-dimensional representations of familiar environments, locating key landmarks and objects relative to each other. Throughout the terms, students solve practical problems involving the four operations. Later on in Term 3, the Year 3s have the opportunity to participate in a Maths competition if they have shown sound knowledge of maths concepts throughout the year.

Students become scientists this term as they learn how materials change when they are heated or cooled. Classrooms move outdoors as they take on a range of experiences. When classrooms move into learning about Australia in Geography they understand the states and capital cities all whilst analysing a map. Students learn the indigenous names for capital cities as well as learning about the different climate in each capital city.

There are many sessions explored throughout the RRRR, all in which you can access online for free to see exactly what is taught. One important strategy to walk away from gender based violence is the 'No, Go, Tell '

- **Say no** (for example, ask the person or people making them feel unsafe to stop)
- **Go** (for example, walk away or get offline)
- **Tell a trusted person** (for example, let someone know what happened or ask for help).

Explore Catholic Christians show hospitality, linking it to the scripture they learn in class. Students look at the role of guests and hosts with the Last Supper and the Feeding of the 5,000.
